We have made an exciting and wonderful start to the 2024 school year. We are getting back into some of our usual activities, learning, incursions, excursions, and special days. It has been great to see the joy and excitement on students' faces when taking part in some of these experiences they have had this term.

This semester it was great to see so many of our students eager to learn and challenge themselves with many different learning tasks. I am proud to see many students receiving Values awards and being proud to demonstrate Mt Hira Values. It was also wonderful to see students in Year 6 enjoying reading and receiving reading awards for their enthusiasm to read. In our assembly students have been learning about the importance of listening and to ensure that this key skill is utilised in all learning environments including when at home. Students have also been learning about what makes a good friend to help them build healthier relationships with their peers. They were also reminded that if they are being bullied in any way to speak to their teachers and seek help so that they feel safe and comfortable to attend school.

We are ensuring that students are reminded constantly about the Mt Hira School Values. Our Values make us who we are and play an important role in our development as people. Therefore, as a school, we are proud of our five core Values: Excellence, Responsibility, Fairness, Honesty, and Respect. We want all of our Junior School students to ensure they are demonstrating these key values consistently in the classroom, out in the playground, and at home.



Our Foundation students have been working on having a routine and structure at school. To help with these key skills, our Foundation students have been involved in a buddy program with our Year 6 students to help support them and guide them in the school environment.

Foundation students had a wonderful special event for all mums, the Mother's day morning tea. Foundation students performed on a beautiful Mother's Day song and also created a craft with their mums. Both students and parents greatly appreciated this event. Throughout the semester Foundation students have also been learning about 2D and 3D shapes. Students also worked on learning how to write a recount and continued to work on their phonics and reading skills.





In Year One, students have thoroughly enjoyed their rhythm and movement incursion during term one. They have also spent a great deal of time learning about characters in a story and even independently described and created their own characters. This has given the Year One students a great opportunity to build on their writing and imaginative skills. Students in Year One also learnt about addition and recapped addition skills that they learnt in Foundation. The Year One students also gained good insight about light and sound through their sound and light incursion.



Year One's have had another great learning experience this term. They have been learning about full stops and commas and how to use these in various sentences and in their writing. Students have also been exploring and learning analogue time which they have found extremely interesting. In Art they have been using clay to create some unique sculptures and have had an enjoyable experience using clay. Students have also been exploring various strategies for mindfulness to assist them to be calm and more focused in their learning. Students also went on an excursion to Science Works and discovered how only three ingredients create all weather! They learnt how water, air, and heat create lightning, rainbows, clouds, and rain had an amazing experience at the interactive 30-minute show in the Lightning Theatre.

In Year Two students had the opportunity to learn about writing a procedure and continued to work on independent reading skills. Students have also begun to learn about sharing in Mathematics to develop their skills in division. They also learnt how some Indigenous Australians make mixtures for paintings in their Integrated learning. The Year 2 students also enjoyed making slime for their Science lesson when they learnt about mixtures and found this a really fun and engaging lesson to learn from.



Our Years 2 to 5 students had a great opportunity to be part of the swimming program for 2024 and enjoyed learning about water safety and other important key swimming skills, which will be of benefit to them forever.



During their integrated sessions, our Year 2 students have been learning about how living things grow and change. They learnt about invertebrate animals and their life processes. In Mathematics, they also worked on solving worded problems using various strategies. The Year Two students have been enjoying their music and drama sessions where they have been learning about how to use their voices to portray various characters.



In Year 3, students have been working on fact and opinion and looking at fiction and non-fiction texts in class. They have also been looking at addition and subtraction strategies to assist them with solving various worded questions in class.

Our Year 3 students have also been learning about the main idea within a text and also learnt about contractions and how they can be used in writing. In Digital technology students have been working on understanding that an algorithm is a set of instructions that solve a problem. They used blocks in Scratch to create a simple program and experimented with different ways of describing a set of instructions.

The students of Year 4 have had another fun filled semester, full of a variety of engaging learning opportunities and experiences that took place. Our Year 4 students explored a range of strategies to work on improving their narrative writing skills. The students have also learnt about different angles and shapes in Mathematics. Students thoroughly enjoyed their excursion to the Islamic Museum of Australia where they deepened their understanding of migration patterns, cultural diversity, and the experiences of Muslim communities throughout time.

In English, students focused on understanding the structure of an explanation text. Students have also been exploring Area and Perimeter in Mathematics and participated in many hands-on activities to gain a deeper understanding of this topic. The Year 4 students also had an incursion on their Science topic Weather and Weathering. During this incursion they engaged in guided activities and discussions that deepened their understanding of weather and weathering, Earth's water cycle, and the rock cycle. The hands-on activities allowed students to explore Earth science. They also had an opportunity to undertake in wind and water erosion activities, as well as investigate PrimeSCI rock collection.



In Year 5, students have been completing many Essential Assessment tasks to build on their Literacy and Numeracy skills. Year 5 students have worked on division strategies and in Integrated, have been exploring solids, liquids, and gases. In Math, they learnt about how to add and subtract Fractions. They also practiced comparing of fractions. In English, students understood the features of persuasive writing and how to use them effectively to persuade readers to take actions to help the planet. This not only enhanced their writing skills but provided students with good insight on what the current environmental issues are that facing planet Earth.

Our Year 5 students had an adventurous time at camp. They attended the camp called Adekate Camp in Ballarat and participated in many fun filled activities like archery, the flying fox, the giant swing and many more. Through these activities students gained fundamental life skills like teamwork, being responsible for oneself and independence.





In term one our Year Six students focused on various topics for Humanities and Science. They covered the topic of Democracy and Parliament. Students were involved in various activities that engaged in an interactive federal election and learnt about preferential voting and absolute majorities. In Science, students learnt about cyclones, how they are formed, and how to prepare when a cyclone affects their state or city. They were also actively involved in class discussions that involved them to think critically. During English lessons, students have been writing narrative stories and are now looking into persuasive writing. Students are conducting class debates on various topics. In Mathematics, students have been working productively through the core content of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Students have also been introduced to various games that involve different topics. During Health sessions, students have learnt about healthy food and their benefits for a healthy lifestyle.

The Year Six students also thoroughly enjoyed their Parliament Process incursion where they participated in hands-on activities to explore the Parliament Process and participate in an interactive federal election, voting role-play, and engage in a House of Representatives debate. Students also gained great knowledge about extreme weather and geological changes through their Hands-on Science Natural Disasters Incursion.



The Year 6 students also have been exploring migration and its effects in Australia and its history.

On the 15th of May, the Year Six students participated in an incursion related to the topic of Migration. Students investigated the immigration process to Australia. They learnt the reasons why people immigrate to Australia from other countries, and they understood the contributions immigrants have made to Australian society. Students participated in hands-on activities to explore the concept of global citizenship and they examined international responses to refugees. They learnt the rights and responsibilities of Australian citizenship and appreciate the diverse and multicultural make-up of Australian society.



We also had many other fantastic events like the Hajj Simulation where students had an opportunity to experience the acts of worship required during Hajj. Additionally, this year we had all of our students from Year Two to Year Six, take part in a 'Camel Riding' experience. Students thoroughly enjoyed this and had some memorable moments. Ours students from F-2 also had a wonderful experience to visit the Mt Hira Mosque in their RE classes and learnt valuable and insightful knowledge about the Mosque. On the 11th of June 2024 all students from Years 2-6 participated in the annual Athletics day event and enjoyed participating in various fun activities like shot put, discus, long jump, track events and many other enjoyable team activities. Students enjoyed this day and are looking forward to next year's Athletics' Day.

I am really pleased to see that our students have had so many wonderful learning experiences and are growing and developing in many skills and values. I do hope that each and every student continues to be successful and enriched this year.

Welcome back to 2024!

The English Domain is pleased to welcome several new teachers to our team: Ms. Hilal Kirmizi, Dr. Youcef Sai, Jumana Hallak and Ms. Susan Keel.

This year, Middle School students will continue to participate in a literacy program called 'Accelerated Reader.' There are prizes available for avid readers and classes will complete to read the most books throughout the year. We would also love for parents to encourage their children to continue reading at home, as one of the best predictors of success in English is how much a student's reads during their leisure time. I would like to congratulate the following students for the impressive amount of reading they have completed so far:

- Zara Ahmad-Azhan who read 764,050 words.
- Muna Adam who has read 512,958 words.
- Jeyda Aziret who has read 374,597 words.
- Zafira Cole who has read 310,324 words.
- Hamza Tog-Dheer who has read 203,004 words.

The students have engaged in a range of different learning activities this semester, to help enrich our English program. Below are a couple of highlights from Semester One:

Jeyda Aziret from Year 7H, provided the following summary about Year Seven English: In the Year Seven English classes this term, we have been looking at diary entries and their structures. Once we familiarised ourselves with the topic, we were given an assessment task. This assessment task required us to go on a website that had testimonies from the stolen generation. After we had taken notes from the videos, we had to write a description of their lives. We then created three diary entries from their point from their point of view. I chose Lorriane McGee-Sippel who was taken from her loving mother at 6 weeks old and was put with a white couple who couldn't have children. For her whole life, she was lied to about how many siblings she had and the race of her mother and father. This topic was very sad, but we still enjoyed taking on the person's persona.

The Year Nine students practiced using and refining their comprehension skills, apply them to clues in an escape room activity. They all became detectives and had to solve the escape room crime scene in order to leave the English classroom – chaos ensued!

We are excited to announce the introduction of an extension class, a first for Mt Hira, designed to accommodate high ability selected students from Year 9 and Year 10. This class currently operates for one hour a week. In this extension class, we delve into topics from both Year 10 Advanced and Year 11 Math Methods, exploring numerous challenging questions to stimulate intellectual growth. We are delighted to report a positive response to this program, with many students demonstrating a strong commitment to their studies in hopes of joining. The atmosphere within the class is truly uplifting, with students feeling motivated, engaged, and empowered to apply critical thinking skills to solve complex problems!







Year 7 students have also engaged in KAHOOT class quizzes to practice NAPLAN style questions. Working through practice questions isn't just about doing well in NAPLAN – it's about building and refining essential math abilities needed for future studies. We're proud of how hard our students have been working to prepare, and we're excited to see them continue to succeed InshAllah.

Congratulations to the Year 7 students who completed the first semester of high school! This term, Year 7 focused on developing essential mathematical study skills, including self-guided learning, decoding word problems, and presenting their work clearly. We are pleased to see Year 7 students working collaboratively and effectively completing their classwork with guidance. We look forward to their continued success in Semester Two.



Moreover, Year 8 students have been exploring the world of real numbers, with a particular focus on decimals and fractions. To reinforce their understanding, they embarked on a mathematically infused game: Bingo! Using their skills in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division with decimals and fractions, they tackled the Bingo board with confidence. This enjoyable activity not only enhanced their grasp of real numbers but also refined their mental math skills.

Year 8 students have had a productive term exploring percentages, probability, and measurement

through engaging hands-on activities. A

highlight was their investigation into the relationship between circumference and diameter using objects like wheels and plates. Working collaboratively or independently, they measured diameters, calculated ratios, and discovered the constant π (pi). This activity sparked lively discussions and enhanced their understanding of geometry, measurement, and data analysis. It was a success in fostering both individual learning and teamwork.

Year 9 students had a busy term covering a wide range of topics while preparing for their semester examination. They utilised various revision materials, including online programmes like Mathletics, class revision games, and collaborative sessions. Their dedication and hard work in preparing for exams has been commendable, and we are proud of their progress and achievements.







Progress in completing General Mathematics Unit 3 in Semester One is on schedule. Congratulations to the students who have successfully completed the unit. To prepare for the end-of-year exam, we regularly integrate past exam questions into our lesson plans. It is heartwarming to see students actively engaged in classwork and effectively collaborating. Despite the challenging topic of Financial Mathematics, students are making significant strides and demonstrating improvements. We are looking forward to a productive Term 3 as we embark on Unit 4.

SCIENCE DOMAIN REPORT

Dear Students, Parents and Carers,

We've been very busy learning about science skills this semester. Students from year 7 and 8 focused on developing their skills in the science laboratory. The year 7 students worked on understanding and classifying the different strands of science. They also focused on revising over laboratory safety procedures by designing their own posters in groups, with a major focus on how to use a Bunsen Burner appropriately.



The year 8 students strived to make the most efficient parachute by researching how they are designed for maximum efficiency. They then implemented their findings while working in their own constructions. Students competed with one another by dropping parachutes with eggs attached from a height, where the winner had the longest airtime of just over 5 seconds and the egg in perfect condition!






Students in the year 9 Biology pathway elective examined the relationship between cell size and the rate of material exchange. The objective of this experiment was to investigate the impact of cell size on how quickly substances can move in or out of them via diffusion. In this experiment, agar jelly simulated the function of cells. By varying the size of these agar model cells, students observed how the rate of exchange of materials such as nutrients and waste changed based on cell size. This experiment assisted students to understand the limitations and advantages related with cell size in biological systems, shedding light on factors that influence the efficiency of molecular transport and nutrient/waste exchange within cells.

"Litter, Litter Everywhere" Incursion: Making a Difference Together!

We are pleased to share the experience of our recent "Litter, Litter Everywhere" incursion. Students learned about litter decomposition rates, the harmful effects of plastic pollution, and bioaccumulation in our food. Did you know a plastic lid can take more than 400 years to decompose? This knowledge has empowered our students to act.

During the incursion, students conducted a litter audit on school grounds, identifying areas with high levels of litter. Based on their findings, we strive to implement new litter prevention

measures, including more bins and educational campaigns. We encourage parents to support these efforts at home by reducing single-use plastics and properly sorting waste. Together, we can foster a culture of sustainability in our community.



The students in Unit 1 VCE Biology are examining the different tissue types by dissecting a cow's kidney. This practical investigation is linked to the Key Knowledge - specialisation and organisation of animal cells into tissues, organs and systems with specific functions: digestive, endocrine and excretory - covered in Area of Study 2.

Year 12 Chemistry Electroplating

Electroplating is a process used to cover objects with a thin layer of metal, which is important for many products. Our students studied how changing the concentration of copper sulfate affects the coating of copper on a metal during electroplating. This information can help improve how we use electroplating in industries. This project gave students the chance to use what they've learned in class in a real experiment. They designed the tests, collected data, and analysed the results, gaining valuable scientific skills.

Year 6 Humanities - On Wednesday the 21st of February both Year Six classes were involved in an incursion that covered the topic of Democracy and Parliament Process. Students examined the democratic process in Australia. They learnt the roles of the three levels of government and how the Australian Federal Parliament relates to the Westminster system. Students engaged in an interactive federal election and learnt about preferential voting and absolute majorities. They participated in a Federal Parliament role play, to illustrate how bills become laws. Students formed political parties and added their own opinions to the debate, allowing their creativity to flourish.







On the 15th of May, the Year Six students have participated in an incursion related to the topic of Migration. Students investigated the immigration process to Australia. They learnt the reasons why people immigrate to Australia from other countries, and they understood the contributions immigrants have made to Australian society. Students participated in hands-on activities to explore the concept of global citizenship and they examined international responses to refugees. They learnt the rights and responsibilities of Australian citizenship and appreciate the diverse and multicultural make-up of Australian society.







Year 7 Humanities – During Term 1 students have covered content on Parliament and how Australia functions democratically as a non-secular society, we also learnt about indigenous culture and the key rights and responsibilities of being an Australian citizen. A highlight of the term was the excursion to Victorian Parliament House and also to the Melbourne Museum.

During Term Two students have covered content on Ancient Egypt. A highlight of the term was the students completing their Ancient Egypt Model – there were some particularly fantastic ones!







Year 8 Humanities – Students have focused on developing their understanding of Democratic processes, how laws are made and what happens when they are broken along with the structure of the Victorian courts system. During term two Students learnt about the Vikings and Medieval Europe. The students completed a poster demonstrating their understanding of the Vikings and in Week 10 also got to participate in a really engaging and fun Medieval Incursion.

Year 9 Humanities – Students have learnt about criminal and civil law and have also been responsible for completing research on global citizens and their influence on the world. In the second term students have learnt about the Industrial revolution and also visited the Shrine of Remembrance during the Term (see the video on our Social Media!)



Year 10 Humanities – In Term 1 students have developed knowledge on humanitarian crisis, the importance of protection of the rights of citizens, international treaties and have examined the constitution and the role of the high court. In Term Two students have learnt about the experiences of War and also examined the role of a significant First Nations Individual.



As part of our curriculum, students have explored the principles outlined in the Australian Guide to Healthy Eating, teaching them to make well-informed and nutritious food choices.

Throughout the semester, our students have engaged in hands-on learning experiences, starting with roast vegetable toasties made with homemade garlic aioli. Additionally, the students have explored a variety of dishes including a wholesome quinoa and corn salad, Asian-inspired honey soy noodles, and even baking, making dinner

rolls from scratch. One standout moment in our food tech journey has been the creation of mini burger sliders, where our students took on the challenge of crafting every element from scratch.

Hospitality year 11 VET

In our Year 11 Hospitality class, we've been delving into the importance of workplace hygiene and cultivating safe work practices. Our VET students have had the opportunity to apply these crucial skills in the kitchen environment, where they've crafted dishes ranging from cheese toasties and pretzels to refreshing smoothies. The students have also been actively engaged in learning how to complete incident reports and identify potential hazards in the kitchen. Our next unit will prepare the students for making espresso-based beverages as they begin working at our student-run school café. The students are very excited to start acquiring skills to help prepare them for hospitality work outside of school.



The Year 12 VET students have kicked off the year with great momentum, taking charge of the café operations. They have successfully mastered the POS




system, contributed to stocktaking, and actively participated in menu development. As they refine their skills during peak service times, they are learning to think quickly on their feet, communicate effectively with their peers, and remain composed under the pressures of a busy service. We've begun the theory components with the introduction of the first scored unit, "Prepare and Serve Non-Alcoholic Beverages," where students will explore a range of drinks, from mocktails to teas to iced beverages. Alongside beverage preparation, they will also acquire essential skills for upholding cleanliness standards in all hospitality areas.


THE ARTS DOMAIN REPORT
