

Dear Students, Parents, and Carers,

The end of Term Three has arrived swiftly, bringing with it a term filled with numerous special days and events for our students. It has proven to be a productive term, marked by students growing in confidence within their learning journeys and exhibiting improved social skills and behaviours.

In Foundation, we celebrated the 100th day of school which was a delightful event. Students dressed up as elderly people, paraded proudly, and received well-deserved cupcakes and certificates in recognition of their 100 days of effort at school. Additionally, students engaged in an intriguing activity, crafting 3D robots from recycled materials. This endeavour captured their interest and enthusiasm, as they proudly showcased their creations at home.

















In Year One, students wrote interesting narratives for Literacy and understood the structure of narratives. Students also continued to work on their VCOP skills and continued using THRASS to build on their spelling skills. In Mathematics students learnt about various 2D and 3D shapes and built a robot using 3D shapes in class. In Health students learnt about different part of their body and in Integrated students were learning about places around the world.

Year Two students learnt about expanded noun phrases and explored the narrative writing genre. They worked on ensuring their setting, plot and characters for their narrative writing were more developed and, detailed and interesting. Students also worked on their subtraction skills through various strategies like the split strategy. For integrated their focus was history and students were learning about famous landmarks. In Art students looked at underwater textile scenes and focused on the Great Barrier Reef.



Year Three students focused on using plurals to enhance their sentence writing skills. Students also completed their cold write on 'The Robot'. In Mathematics, students worked on their multiplication skills through repeated addition. Students also focused on division and completed many worded problems using their division skills. For Integrated students explored the topic of recycling and importance of reducing the usage of plastic to improve the environment. The Year Three students also had a wonderful experience at the Ceres community environment park where they gained extensive knowledge on Aboriginal culture.



In Year Four, our students thrived across multiple subjects. In Mathematics, the exploration of fractions, decimal numbers, and money ensued, encompassing conversions and practical money-related problem-solving. Students also enjoyed their excursion to Sealife Melbourne, where they gained deeper insights into different sea life creatures and their survival mechanisms in various environments. The students also engaged in guided tours and discussions, enriching their understanding of diverse life cycles and habitats. The Year Four students had an amazing time at Sealife and came back with much more knowledge of sea animals.









Year Five students delved into learning adverbial phrases and adjectives to assist in enhancing their writing skills. In Mathematics students continued to work on their division skills and also focused on number patterns. During Science week students had an incursion on the science of sound, they also learnt to recycle and reuse everyday items to create their own musical items. Students thoroughly enjoyed this experience and learnt a lot.

On August 27th, as part of Book Week, our Year Six students embarked on an excursion to the State Library, exploring its rich heritage spaces, including the awe-inspiring La Trobe

Reading Room. This experience kindled appreciation for libraries' significance in both personal and community contexts.



Science Week brought forth engaging activities and creative costume designs, showcasing students' enthusiasm for scientific discovery. Similarly, Book Week's Character Dress Up Day spotlighted the creative ideas of parents and students, reinforcing their shared love for reading. The Book Fair's success enabled our library to secure an array of new books for the upcoming term.



We also had a great success amongst the Year Six boys' interschool soccer competition. The boys demonstrated remarkable prowess in regional finals for interschool soccer, securing victories in both sets of finals against four different schools. Their success earned them a place in the Southern Metro League finals, a significant achievement. Congratulations to the Year Six boys on this outstanding accomplishment!'

Our Junior school students also thoroughly enjoyed attending Taekwondo sessions where they built key skill in strengthening their bodies and building on resilience. Currently our Year 10 students are completing their work experience placements, which involved students searching for the own placements at a range of different workplaces. This provided the students with great experience on how to approach employers and seek opportunities. Throughout this week students will be gaining a taster of their desired career path to see if it is an industry that would suit them in the future. Our students should be congratulated for their effort in seeking exciting placement opportunities, including in publishing, construction, law, medical and business.

Our Year 10 students also participated in the 2024 VCE subject expo, where students were able to freely roam the different stalls set up for each subject and speak to the teachers to gain an understanding of what each entailed. The most exciting part of book week was dress up day. Students were invited to dress up as a book character of their choice and many of the students put in a lot of effort to create amazing outfits!







Message from the Debating Coordinator:




Dear Mt Hira Community,



Our VCE Unit 1/2 Biology students recently enjoyed an enlightening excursion to the Melbourne Botanical Gardens, where they delved into the world of plant adaptations and reproductive strategies. The excursion provided a hands-on learning experience, allowing students to observe firsthand how various plant species have evolved to thrive in diverse environments such as deserts and rainforests.

Students explored unique adaptations such as drought-resistant features and specialized pollination strategies, including plants which have adapted to obtain nitrogen by consuming small animals. Students engaged in a scavenger hunt with the lush plant life and interactive signs and gained valuable insights into the complexities of plant biology. This real-world application of their studies enhanced their understanding and ignited a deeper appreciation for the natural world.



Our Unit 3 and 4 VCE Biology students recently had an exciting hands-on experience at Swinburne University, conducting advanced laboratory experiments in Genetics. Year 6 Humanities


Students participated in interactive games in which they purchased, produced, and sold materials and goods to investigate the role supply, demand and government have in setting market prices.





Year 9 Humanities

After learning about trench warfare, the landing in Gallipoli and the reasons for enlisting in 'the war to end all wars' in Term Two, the Year Nine cohort had the fantastic opportunity to visit The Shrine of Remembrance. Students toured the historic building to see some incredible artefacts and commemorate the fallen soldiers of WWI.





In Term Three, Year Nine students have explored the key features of the Australian economy. To understand how consumer and business decision making can impact the economy and society, students engaged in friendly games of 'monopoly'.






Year 10 Humanities and Electives

Students in Year Ten Humanities have explored the causes, consequences and experiences of the Second World War. A highlight of the term was a lesson in which students got hands-on experience with authentic artefacts from the Second World War and Nazi Germany. This experience sparked students' empathy and allowed them to connect with the past in a active way – helping them to understand the sacrifices and challenges people around the world experienced in the 20th century









Year Ten students in Elective Legal Studies have explored what makes an effective law and how our current justice system investigates and prosecutes criminal offences. Students engaged in a range of hands-on activities. Students engaged in debate about what makes a crime serious or minor, and conducted a crime scene investigation to question the reliability of evidence collection methods.

Year VCE Legal Studies

On July 17th, VCE Legal Studies students visited the Melbourne judicial precinct. Students visited the Melbourne Magistrates Court and Supreme Court. Year Eleven student Nevin Gurbuz recounts the excursion:

On Wednesday the 17th of July all of us had a look at what our future could end up looking like, and when I'm talking about the future, I don't mean the wrong side of the law, I mean learning it, as well as enforcing it.

The day began with most of the year eleven's arriving at Dandenong station, in hand, our myki's, prepared to be using public transport with the school for the first time.

Once we arrived at the court room we had to bow out of respect to the judge and listen to the real cases that were going on. After the experience at Magistrate court, we went to Nando's and ate as a whole class, discussing the events that had just taken place.

In the afternoon, we went to the Supreme Court where we met the volunteers who summarized what everything was and when it was made/ how old the building was. Then they introduced us to a judicial registrar, Deidre McCann, who explained how she chose her job and why.

Later, the volunteers led us to the major court trial on Adam Tiba, showing us how evidence proves with reasonable doubt on whether he was guilty or not, we didn't stay too long then to know.

After the courts and the full day, we were then on our way to the train station, which was a whole experience in itself, but while on the train I realize how even now it made the whole journey even more insightful, on whether we could potentially see ourselves in that field.



Year 9 and 11 Business Stalls

On the 3rd September, students from the Year Nine Business Elective and Year Eleven Business Management ran the annual Mt Hira Business stalls. Students used their creativity to develop a business plan and market a product which would meet their target market, Mt Hira students and teachers, and ensure that they would not only cover their costs but make a profit. Students worked tirelessly to promote their stalls and ensure all products were safe for their customers.
